## 4. Christian Diehl to his family, 1863

June the 21st 1863

Dear Mother, Brothers, Sisters

Brothers-in-law and Sisters-in-law.
I myself have to write you a few lines or you'll still think
I am wearing out, how and where I was wounded, you know

- but that my wound is pretty much healed and I don't have any more pain.

  Dear Mother, I would have written sooner but through our moving around I could not well. We moved from [...]
- 20 hospital to Washington and we were there four days then we had to go to Baltimore. From Baltimore to Philadelphia from there another 10 miles farther in a nice hospital.
- Dear Mother, you asked if I have clothes and sweets enough to eat I have here more than I can eat and better than I can have at home and

beyond that, for each week we
receive a rain shirt, four under pants and socks and a coat that is distributed by the hospital and doesn't cost us anything,
After the battle we got money for two months.

I think if we have to move again then everyone will be sent

- in his own [...] then I will probably come to Madison, writing is going poorly with me and my hands
- have grown shaky through the long lying in the bed and the bandages in my face, I can't see well.

  I will tell you the story better next time.

  I now want to close my letter and
- I wish that these few lines reach you in good health and greet everyone many thousand times.
