[55] SARAH KRUEGER TO ALEXANDER KRUEGER, NOVEMBER 8, 1898 Slides 312 - 328.

Florenceville, Iowa Nov. 8. 1898. Dear brother, I will write you a letter today and tell you

- 5 a letter today and tell you about my trip. I will start at the beginning and tell ^{you} what we did every day and where we were.
- 10 We got to Madison at 10.30, ate our lunch, and had our valice's checked, and then went to the capitol, there was a man there who took us through the
- 15 building, but I would not want to go through with him the second time because he seemed to be a genuine flirt, he was alright untill we got up to the
- 20 dome then he asked us wether we were married, and he says he wanted to show us the city in the afternoon, but we told him that we wanted to call on
- 25 some friends, there and so he did not come with us, from there we went to Scince Hall but did not get into the musium I knocked at the Janitors room
- 30 three times but nobody opened and so we went out again and from there went to the green house, but the gardener seemed kind of queer to me, I asked
- 35 him if we could see the building he says yes we could look at it, but that was all he said to us, we went through the building our selves, from there
- 40 we went to the dairy building, but ^{the} butter maker never looked at

us when we come in, but there was another young man he came up to us. I asked him that we

- 45 would like to see the building he said there was not much to see just now, but he would show it to us and he did show us all the rooms, from there
- 50 went to Mrs Rowe, I had no trouble in finding the place. I knocked at door and a lady come, and I though to my self when she opened
- 55 the door that it was Mrs. Rowe, and sure enough it was. I asked her if Mrs. Rowe lived there, she says "Yes I am Mrs. Rowe my
- 60 self," and when I told her who I was, then she told us to come in, and was friendly and good to us, it was about half past one when we got there
- 65 and they were just eating dinner I heard her husband talking but did not see him. Mrs Rowe said that a boy was boarding by her, he is one of last years
- 70 boys his name is Schulte. Mrs. Rowe said that you knew him well, he had been to the war and now is boarding there to regain his health,
- 75 I heard him talk but did not see him, we stayed there till three oclock then Mrs. Rowe treated us to some cake and apples, and told
- 80 me that when I go home again, then I should stop a few day by her, well we went from there to see Mrs. Klienhietz, I rang the bell and
- 85 a fine looking boy came to the door. I asked him wether Mrs. Klienhietz was home, he said yes

and he went and called her when I saw her coming, I knew

- 90 at the first glance that it was her, because you described her so often to me, that I knew her well I told her that I was, "Mr. Krea si swester,"
- 95 and she was as friendly as you said she would be, the three little girl were home when we got there, but after we were there about half an hour, then
- 100 the three other girls came so I saw the whole family except Mr. Klienhietz he was down at the farm. I asked her wether she got your
- 105 picture, and she said yes, they got it and that her husband intended to write to you soon. they also got Kock's wedding picture, but Mrs. Klienhietz
- 110 said that you had the nicest looking wife. and she said that she always though that I would be married to Koch because you and he wereso
- 115 much together and he had been down to our place, and she says another thing was, that you and Kock always got letters, and when she took{s}
- 120 them upstairs, she always looked at the addresses and the writting seemed to be so much alike, that she though, I always wrote a
- 125 letter to you and also to Kock, Mrs. Klienhietz has two University roomers, has them since the school began. she says that is all she wants this winter
- 130 and she told me to tell you to come and see them this winter and stay by them, she had lots of room for you. she also

told me that when I go home

- 135 that I should stop by her and stay all night with them, well we left there at about half past four, and then we went to Scince Hall again, and I knocked
- 140 at the Janitor door again, but nobody opened, so we went out again, and from there ^{we} went and took a look at the stores around the capitol, and then it began
- to get dark, and so we went down to the depot, and got on the ^{train} 6.45 and we got to Prairie du Chien at 9.55. and we got of and looked around
- 150 but saw nobody that we knew, and we just started to walk into the depot. then Fred Hoffman met us, and we started to his home he was there with a double
- 155 buggy and two horse's. they live three and a half miles from the depot. for about two miles we went on level ground and then we started to go up hill for
- 160 about a miles, it is the longest hill that I ever went up. they leave the horse's rest a few times when they go up, and when they go down they tie
- 165 one wheel so that it wont go round, well we got to Roth's at eleven oclock, and they got a nice supper for us, and then went to bed, and the $\frac{\text{next}}{\text{day}}$
- 170 in the afternoon, Ida, Emma Roth and I walked about two miles to a bluff called Brisbor's point¹ it is a very high bluff. it is about two hund-
- 175 red feet higher then the city when we ^{were} up there we could look all over the city and surrounding

country. that bluff is one of the most noted bluffs around there

- 180 because, three people are burried there. and there is a high mounument, put up there in memory of them, we walked down that bluff a little ways and
- 185 we sat down to rest, and then Ida took mine and Emma Roths picture. we took the plate to the Photagrapher Saterday, we will get it the
- 190 latter part of this week I will send my pictures home and you can all take a look at it,

The next day we three girls

- 195 started away in the morning and went across the bluffs to Frank Rotes place aunt Tilly old home, we got there at about ten oclock, and at eleven
- 200 oclock, Fred Hoffman came with the team and showed us the city. it is one of the oddest city's that I have ever seen. most of the building's are old and
- 205 odd looking, the schools are very nice buildings and the St. Marys Convent is a nice building. I also saw the ruins of Fort Crawford, and also the
- 210 artission wells, the main street in Prairie du Chien, is a different street then I have ever seen because there are springs on each side of the street and a stream
- 215 of flowing water running each side of the street.Well I gave a descripsion of the city as well as I could, the third day, Fred and us three girl went
- 220 on the buggy, and Albert and Frank Roth went on there wheels and we all went down to the river fishing. we drove about

ten miles before we got to

- 225 the place were we intended to fish, we took some lunch along and unhitched the horses and had a regular picnic there, but we did not get any
- 230 fish, they would not bite. Roths got a nice farm and also nice buildings except the house that is a poor looking building. I think
- 235 you would be surprised if you would see Fred becaused he is a different boy alltogether then he was was when he was by us. he is
- 240 full of fun and keeps talking right along, they all seem to be nice boys we had lots of fun with them every evening when the boys were all in the house
- 245 there are six of them, three of the boys are nice singers they sang songs every evening and there sister played the organ. we were up till
- 250 twelve every evening, well we went away Saterday morning at 7.5. Fred took us to the depot, and we had to wait an hour at McGreger and
- an hour and a half at Calmar.and we got to Cresco at2 P.M. Aunt Tina anduncle Amil were at thedepot, and Amil took us to
- 260 a hotel and we had a fine dinner. John and Fred Bigalk were also in Cresco and also Mrs. Hilke and Ella and Nellie they invited us to come
- 265 and see us maybe we will go some time this week. uncle William was also in Cresco. and he invited us to come and see them Sunday. and so aunt

- 270 Tina, her hired man, Ida and I all went to church Sunday forenoon, there we met the whole relation. aunt Lydia aunt Hannah, Amanda; Ida
- 275 Arthur, Alex, Eddie, Willie, Lorenia, aunt Amelia and Ida. and uncle William, and also Henry Fisher, and we all went to aunt Bertha
- 280 for dinner, and had a good time that afternoon, we went back to aunt Tina again and we went to aunt Hannah yesterday afternoon we are here
- 285 at the present time writting this letter. it is almost noon now and I have been writting for the last two hours. we are going to aunt Lydia this afternoon

290 and see her intend to stay there the next night. I have also seen uncle Gottlieb and that in a very funny way. when we came from Cresco

295 last Saterday, we saw a man sitting on a wagon in a rocking chair and Amil said that is the way the people go riding here and we all started to

300 laugh. and just then the man looked around. and Tina said it was Gottlieb. she did not know that it was him else we surely would not have

305 laughed the way we did. I asked aunt Lydia wether he was mad but she said he was not so it is allright. Well dinner is almost ready and

310 so I will close Goerge Volkman is going to take this letter to Florenceville this afternoon this is the longest letter that I have ever written. I must

tell you yet that the

people are very good to us and I have enjoyed my trip very much so far. Aunt Hannah sends her

- 320 best regards to you and Tina and she says you and Tina should come to see them. Well Good by and I hope to hear from you
- 325 soon, and write me all the new. Your sister Sarah Krueger
