Little Rock, Ark.
December 12, 1864
Dear sister,
Yesterday I was on the picket line

It was very cold, but last night we had a hearty fire, on the picket post I also received the letter that you wrote on the 1st of December,

10 it made me very happy, that you are still healthy and have remained in one place for so long, it is much nicer than if it were, the

15 Schneiders farmhand is already moved to another place. the letter that you wrote on November 17th, with the last shirt that you sent, I have

20 received and am very happy with it, if I wanted to sell it, I could get 16 dollars for the two,

had several days of pretty

 27th Wis. Regt, they are

 guarding the railroad on the other
 side of the Arkansas river
